Why children's books are so important for every young child...and for society!

Many serious problems facing our community today can be traced to reading problems in school-aged children. A child who cannot read with understanding by the end of Grade 3 is less likely to find success in further schooling and adult work. We now know that the crucial time to prepare the child for reading success is from birth to age three.

Learning to read is difficult if a child has no experience with books in the early years of language development. Reading to young children builds their vocabularies (see next article) and leads to an understanding of how books work, how spoken words can be written, and how books and reading are pleasurable. This is all crucial for successfully learning to read in school. For this, a home needs children's books! Even a top quality childcare program that includes some reading aloud cannot make up for a home with no bedtime book-sharing sessions by a loving parent or caregiver.

The BookStart Fund's eight partner agencies meet regularly with low-income families to help with the many challenges they face. In repeated visits, usually in the home, a mentoring relationship develops between staff member and parents as they work together on effective parenting practices. These include talking and reading to the children in the first three years, using the carefully chosen books from BookStart.

Thanks to donations to the BookStart Fund at the Community Foundation, we provide our partner agencies with a steady stream of books that are fun for the parents and children and that the family can relate to. The agencies' parent educators introduce the books and model age appropriate ways to use them, sharing with the parents how to enjoy the book with their children—exploring the words and pictures in a positive, loving way.

Wonderful things happen when the agencies take beautiful, new books into their clients' homes—and leave them there as gifts!

Here's an example, from *Head*, *Shoulders*, *Knees and Toes*, by Annie Kubler:






Why reading picture books is better than just talking to young children

Research on the words in children's picture books shows why the BookStart program is so important. Here's the start of an article, by Susan Frey, describing the findings:

In "The Pout-Pout Fish" children's picture book, the author weaves words like "aghast" and "grimace" into a story about a fish who thought he was destined to "spread the dreary-wearies all over the place" until... well, no need to spoil the ending.

Finding such rich language in a picture book is not unusual, and reading those stories aloud will introduce children to an extensive vocabulary,



Reading aloud is the best way to help children develop word mastery and grammatical understanding, which form the basis for learning how to read, said Massaro, who studies language acquisition and literacy. He found that picture books are two to three times as likely as parent-child conversations to include a word that isn't among the 5,000 most common English words.
