Reading is becoming contagious at homeless shelters

BookStart's Partner Agencies that serve homeless families have become so aware of the benefits to their "guests" of promoting reading to little children that some of them are now looking for books for older children, too. The BookStart Fund's mission is to provide parents with enticing new books to be read to their zero to three age children. We are thrilled that the staff at the homeless shelters now want books for older children! Let's see if our readers will help with that. Gently used, appropriate books for school age children are welcomed.

Thanks to the Book Start program, reading is now something that we are focusing on with all the children in our homeless shelter. The staff and volunteers are making reading a part of almost every day in our shelter. When parents are using the

computer in the offices to job search, kids can often be found sitting in the "library" reading and looking at books. The little ones get a tote bag from BookStart for keeping their new books in. That has inspired us to expand our book section to add a "Young Adult" section for teenagers. Volunteers and staff sit with parents and kids during the dinner hour and read to the kids to give parents a little "down time" and to reinforce the need to expose children to the way reading can expand your mind and knowledge. If you've ever

seen a child walk into your office with a book in hand and a smile on their face, you know that reading is a valuable skill to give to children.

Books can be dropped off during the work day (preferably) or evenings during the week to the shelter. Call 458-9772 and ask for Nancy McCammon-Hansen or Shirley Rork.

From Julie Conroy, Director of Chara 10:14, the childcare at Charis House:


One benefit of the BookStart program I have seen is older children reading to younger ones. And it's not always siblings. Older children sometimes are more relaxed and know how to "read" to others because of



school experiences. One child who has speech delays has greatly benefitted from this program. His mother spends each evening reading to him and we are definitely seeing progress. He will ask one of us to sit and listen to him read!

A new favorite book: Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star



The text is the traditional lullaby, including all five verses, but look at these illustrations! Note the focus on cross-species friendships and universal going to bed routine.

Six "animal" friends (frog, hamster, crow, skunk, possum, and mouse) head home when the stars first appear. Lovingly welcomed home by their parents, after dinner they each go through familiar bedtime routines—including being read to. How could we not love this book?

Throughout the pages, a fox quietly goes through the village, lighting the lamps—helping to "light the traveler in the dark."

New BookStart advisors add mix of savvy and soundness


