"Getting babies and books together"

Books as Communication Tools

Imagine that you are reading a new book with an 11-month old infant on your lap. You turn the page and she swivels her head around and looks at you inquisitively. You respond with "What is that?" She begins to babble and point. The conversation is off and running!

Getting books into the hands of infants, toddlers, and family members is a vital way to promote strong communication skills. Donors to BookStart realize this and provide an important community resource for families in Fort Wayne.

Why are books powerful as a communication tool? First, communication begins before the spoken word. When very young children respond to a book by making facial expressions, gestures (e.g., pointing) and sounds (e.g., grunts, squeals), it is clear that they are trying to tell us something. When we respond to their communication, they learn that sharing ideas is important. In addition, they learn to take turns in a conversation – first I share, then you share, and repeat! Moreover, when we stop reading to respond to the children's communication attempts, they learn that they are worthy of other people's time. This knowledge can only be gained during interactions with important others.

Infants and toddlers need multiple opportunities throughout the day to engage in meaningful conversations. Because receptive language develops prior to expressive language, very young children comprehend spoken language long before they produce it. In fact, having rich conversations early on is associated with stronger language skills later in life (Norris, 2017). Having a wide range of books in each home allows adults to select books which reflect the child's mood and interests each day. Parents cannot do this without a library of books from which to select just the right book for the moment and the BookStart Fund gets those home libraries started!


Gift Ideas for the Children in Your Life

Liz Garton Scanlon and Marla Frazee, 2009 A book that will move the heart of everyone, it is an ode to all things great and small in our


world. For families with older children, get it in the large hardback format to enjoy the detailed Caldecott Award winning illustrations.
